









## director's statement

Leadbeater is the intimate observation of a group of romantically reserved college students in Baltimore's flourishing art scene. An incredibly personal project for the entire cast and crew, I strove to craft a film that celebrated both the landscape that my classmates and I had come to embrace during our own arts education, and the colorful real life characters we met, befriended, and became. From filming in locations that the actors and crew actually lived in, to working with a local band that I was already a fan of, and casting actors with previously built relationships—it was a personal affair all around.

These characters my actors and I created are complicated, problematic, and real. The struggles that they face with their complex interpersonal relationships are real. Laurel struggles with mental illness and emotional repression. Bandit is manipulative and shaming. Ricardo is brusk. Danny's head is in the clouds. Pete is oblivious. At the end of the day though, these are all well intentioned people that share an intense bond with one another like any other group of college friends.

Most importantly though, Laurel, Bandit, Ricardo, and Danny are queer. Be clear, it's not important because their sexualities define them, but because they don't. It's not enough for filmmakers to create queer characters for our stories anymore, but to create queer characters that are as well developed and defined as their straight counter-parts, and are not forced to meet tragic fates.

This is what Leadbeater is set out to accomplish. To entertain, validate, and reflect the young artists of today.

16mm

The choice to shoot portions of the movie with 16mm film came after director Tyler Peterson saw Bethany Michalski's previous work in the medium. A Bolex 16mm camera was then chosen to shoot the flashback portions of the film, creating a dreamy aesthetic to mirror the nostalgia associated with memories. By having two seprate cinematographers for the present and past of the story, this created two distinct looks to bring to the film.
